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of Charles Wesley and nephew of John Wesley the founders of Methodism is best known today for his musical compositions and for his promotion of the music of J S Bach At the heart of this source book is a calendar of Samuel Wesley s correspondence The editors date and summarise the content of over 1100 surviving letters and other documents most of which have not previously been published The book accordingly reveals considerable new information about Wesley and his complex personal affairs including his incarceration for debt and his confinement in a lunatic asylum for a year Many details are provided about London musical life in the era from Boyce to Mendelssohn that prior scholars have not taken into account The book also presents a chronology of Wesley s life a descriptive list of his nearly 550 musical and literary works a discography an iconography and a bibliography It therefore is the most comprehensive available reference source for Wesley s life times and music

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
