Developed by British psychologist John Bowlby and later expanded by Mary Ainsworth, explores the emotional bonds that form between children and their caregivers and how these early relationships shape a person's future interactions and sense of security. It's a foundational concept in psychology, emphasizing that the way a child bonds with their primary caregiver profoundly affects their emotional and social development.

Attachment as a Biological Need

Bowlby proposed that attachment is a biological need, designed to keep infants close to their caregivers to ensure safety and survival. When children experience a secure attachment, they feel safe and supported, which provides them with the confidence to explore the world.
