As such this book draws from sociolinguistics, the sociology of language and psycholinguistics. The relationship between language and identity, whether of an individual or a group, is a strong thread linking all the topics covered in the book. The shift to Hebrew as a national language is at the root of the creation of Israel, yet many Jewish immigrants still use the language of their country of origin. Ultra-orthodox communities retain their own codes and the use of Arabic remains a clear marker of the Israeli Arab town and village. At the same time, Israel's position in international affairs has encouraged a wide penetration of the society along class lines by languages of world-wide communication. These very same languages, for example English and French, have different values in their local context and play active and different roles in the formation of social boundaries.
