NOTE: For cardinals, **uno** changes to **un** before **masculine** nouns and to **una** before **feminine** nouns; cardinals agree **gender** and **number** with their nouns; **primo** and **terzo** (and **secondo**, **quinto**, **sesto**, **settimo**, **ottavo**, **nono**, **decimo**) agree in **gender** and **number** with their nouns.

- Words ending in *-ción* or *-ción* or the consonants *n* or *s* have stress on the next-to-last syllable and are called **palabras graves**: *ca-bi-lón* (cheese), *ca-ba-jero* (cranes), *ca-ba-jero* (cherry).
- Words ending in a consonant other than *n* or *s* have stress on the last syllable and are called **palabras agudas**: *doc-tor* (doctor), *ca-pa-jero* (Spanish), *fr-ío* (cold), *ca-mpeón* (champion).
- When a word does not conform to either of the previously mentioned rules, a written accent indicates where the stress falls: *ca-bi-lón* (coffee), *ca-ba-jero* (iron), *ca-ba-jero* (cranes); words with stress on the third from the last syllable are called **palabras esdrújulas**.
- A written accent is also used to distinguish between two words with the same spelling but different meanings, such as *ca-bi-lón* (iron) and *ca-ba-jero* (cherry) and *ca-ba-jero* (cranes) and *ca-ba-jero* (cherry).

- A single vowel sound, with or without accompanying consonants, makes up a syllable.
 - Diphthongs and triphthongs blend to make a single vowel sound and cannot be divided.
 - A diphthong combines a strong vowel (a, e, i) and a weak vowel (i, u, ai, er, aw), as in **chance** (chance), two weak vowels can also form a diphthong: **city** (city), **rain** (rain).
- A triphthong consists of a strong vowel between two weak ones: **rain** (rain) (you remember)
- Two strong vowels do not form a diphthong and are separated into two syllables: **man** (man), **day** (day)
- A written accent on a weak vowel makes a diphthong, separating it into two syllables: **man** (man), **day** (day)
- A single consonant forms a syllable with the vowel (or a single vowel sound in the case of a diphthong or triphthong) that follows it: **man** (man), **day** (day)
- The digraphs **ch**, **sh**, and **r** represent a single sound and cannot be separated: **man** (man), **day** (day), **man** (man), **day** (day)
- When two consonants come between two vowels, the first consonant goes with the preceding vowel and the second consonant goes with the following vowel: **man** (man), **day** (day)
- Exception: When **b**, **d**, **t**, **g**, **p**, or **r** is followed by **i** or **e**, both consonants go with the following vowel: **man** (man), **day** (day)
- When three consonants come between two vowels, the first two consonants go with the preceding vowel and the third consonant goes with the following vowel: **man** (man), **day** (day)
- Exception: When **b**, **d**, **t**, **g**, **p**, or **r** is followed by **i** or **e**, only the first consonant goes with the preceding vowel, the last two consonants go with the following vowel: **man** (man), **day** (day)

- Capitalize in Spanish.
- The first word in a sentence: *Voy mañana*. (I am going tomorrow.)
- Proper nouns, such as names of countries, people, continents, and geographic features: *Estados Unidos, Madrid, Europa, Everest*.
- The first word of a title (and proper nouns, if any): *Chen antes de volar* (One Hundred Years of Solitude).
- Abbreviated personal titles: *Sra. Ramos, Dr. Gómez*.
- Do not capitalize in Spanish:
 - Nouns denoting nationality or religious affiliation: *irlandés* (Irish), *católico* (Catholic).
 - Names of languages: *español* (Spanish), *ruso* (Russian).
 - Days of the week and months of the year: *lunes*, *el día de mayo* (Monday, May 2).
 - Second (and informal) titles: *señor* Columbus, *señorita* Villalazquez.

- Some articles indicate a specific person, place, or thing. The Spanish definite articles *el, la, los, and las* (which translate to *the* in English) are used with:
 - Individuals used as nouns, especially at the beginning of a sentence: *El estudiante es bueno.* (Studying in good.)
 - Nouns in a series: *Panque de libro, el cuaderno y el bolígrafo están en mesa.* (I put the book, notebook, and pen on the table.)
 - Certain nouns such as *ciudad* (city) and *escuela* (school), where English often omits the article: *¿Van a la ciudad?* (Are they going to just? Ella va a la escuela. (She is going to school.)
- Abstract concepts: *La bondad es una virtud.* (Kindness is a virtue.)
- Nouns of weight or measure: *Las peras cuestan un dólar la libra.* (The pears cost one dollar a pound.)
- Titles when used with a name: *La Dra. García Ramírez.* (Dr. García called.)

- Most nouns ending in *-a* and nouns denoting males are masculine: *o libro* (the book), *o homem* (the man)
- Exceptions: *o mano* (the hand) and abbreviated words such as *o moto* (the motorcycle, short for *a motocicleta*), *o foto* (the photo, short for *a fotografia*), and *o disco* (the discophone, short for *a discoteca*) are feminine
- Most nouns ending in *-o* and nouns denoting females are feminine: *a mesa* (the table), *a mulher* (the woman)
- Exceptions: Words of Greek origin ending in *-ma*, *-po*, and *-ta* such as *o programa* (the program), *o mapa* (the map), and *o planeta* (the planet) are masculine
- Nouns ending in *-ão*, *-ãoz*, *-ãoz*, *-ãoz*, and *-ãoz* are also masculine: *o irmão* (the brother), *o cidadão* (the city), *o brasileiro* (the Brazilian), *o jovem* (the youth), *o machucado* (the wound)
- Some nouns have the same form for both genders: *o artista* (the artist), *o pianista* (the pianist), *o cliente* (the client)

- Days of the week to indicate when something occurs, where English uses "on": *Vamos al cine el sábado.* (We are going to the movies on Saturday.)
- Parts of the body or articles of clothing, especially with reflexive verbs: *Me pongo el abrigo.* (I put on my coat.)
- Names of certain cities, countries, and continents: *En Florida, en Ecuador, la América del Sur*
- Proper nouns modified by an adjective: *el profesor de español* (the teacher of Spanish)
- The hour when something time: *Es la una.* (It is one o'clock.)

INDEFINITE ARTICLES

Indefinite articles (*un, una*) in English indicate a nonspecific person, place, or thing; the Spanish indefinite articles *un, una, uno, una,* and *uno/a* are:

- Used in the same way as in English and normally come before the noun
- Not used in certain situations, such as after *ser* (to be) when the noun following *ser* is not modified: *Yo soy profesora.* (I am a teacher.) *¿Dónde vive tu mamá?* (Where does your mother live?)

To make a noun plural:

- Add -s to a noun ending in a vowel: *library* (book) → *libraries* (books), *passion* (door) → *passions* (doors)
- Add -s to a noun ending in a consonant: *wealth* (wealth) → *wealths* (wealths), *profession* (profession) → *professions* (professions)
- Change a to e and add -es to a noun ending in -s: *hypothesis* (hypothesis) → *hypotheses* (hypotheses), *hour* (hour) → *hours* (hours)

- Adverbs are placed before the adjectives they modify but usually after the verb: *La profesora es muy simpática.* (The teacher is very nice.) *Ellos bailan bien.* (They dance well.)
- In a series of adverbs, the feminine form is used for all adverbs but *-mente* is placed only on the last one: *Elena habla lento, claro y seriamente.* (Elena speaks slowly, clearly, and earnestly.)
